County Property Taxes 2009-10

Property taxes levied in 2009-10 are **reduced by 7.9% or \$848 Million** from 2008-09
 Property taxes levied have reduced by \$14% or **\$1.62 Billion** since 2006-07

Est. taxable property values: *\$1.5 Trillion, a reduction of 11.02%* or \$187.2 Billion from 2008-09.

If no millage rates were changed – this would represent a loss to counties of \$1.18 Billion.

Counties with new construction and adjusted millage rates only made up 28% - \$334 M of this loss, leaving more than \$848 million to be absorbed through reduced services.

⁷ Data for 56 of Florida's counties is based off of their final property tax data submitted to the Florida Department of Revenue on Form-DR422. Data for the remaining 11 counties is based off of their preliminary property tax report submitted to the Florida Department of Revenue on Form DR-420.

⁸ During the county budget process, a proposed millage rate establishes a maximum millage rate in the final budget hearing. Numbers were calculated solely for comparison purposes as there is no statewide millage rate.



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36 counties increased their millage rate, of those 29 remained below the rollback rate. For Example: Charlotte County, increased the millage by .0138 yet remains 16% BELOW the rollback rate with \$24 million in decreased revenues - a 16.6% drop from 2008.

REVISED DATA (January 2010)

51 counties (76%) will collect less property tax revenue
16 counties (24%) will collect more property tax revenue

PRELIMINARY DATA (October 2009)

45 counties (67%) will collect less property tax revenue
22 counties (33%) will collect more property tax revenue

58 counties are below the roll back rate
2 counties are adopting the roll back rate⁹
