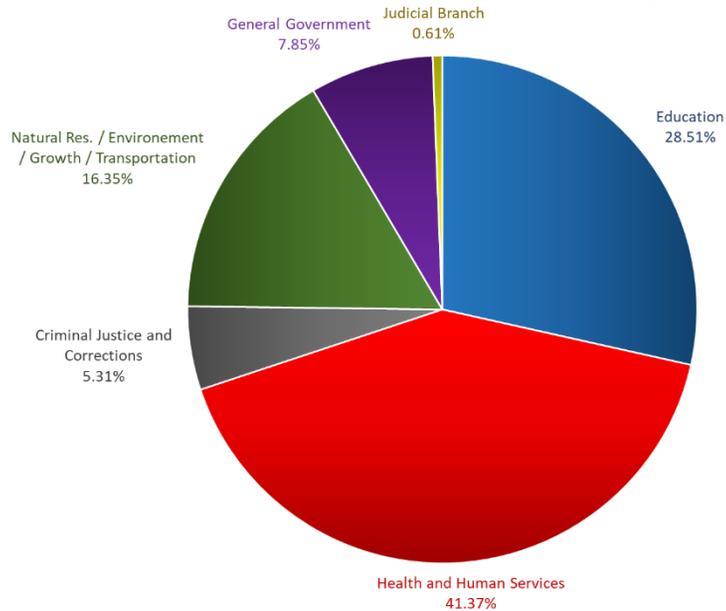


## 2019- 2020 Florida House’s and Senate’s Proposed State Budgets

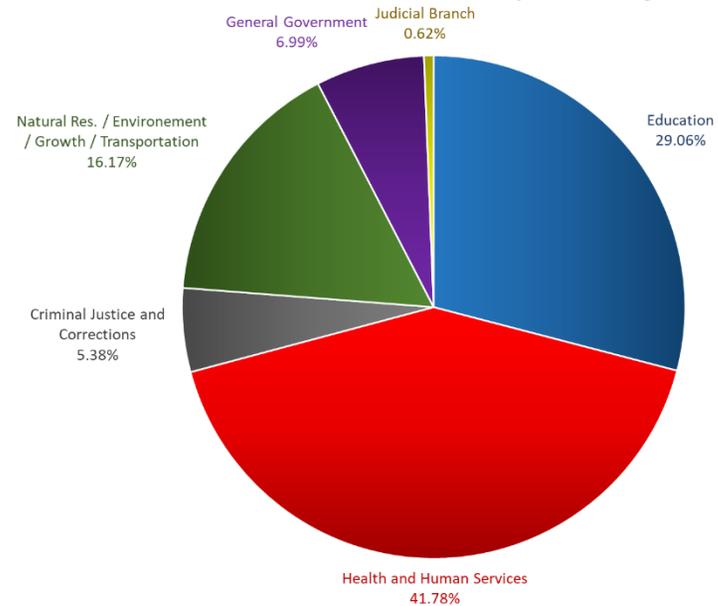
### 2019-2020 House and Senate Budgets – General Overview

The Florida House of Representatives and the Florida Senate are each considering their own proposed State Budget for the 2019-2020 State Fiscal Year that begins on July 1<sup>st</sup>. Each proposed budget, as well as associated conforming and implementing legislation, will be considered and voted on by each chamber’s respective Appropriations Committee, before being considered and voted on by each chamber’s entire body. The proposals will then head to budget conferences to resolve remaining differences and produce a single General Appropriations Act (GAA) to be voted on by both chambers. If passed by majorities in each chamber, the GAA will then be delivered to the Governor for his approval. The Governor has the discretion to veto the entire GAA, entire sections of the GAA, and individual line items in the GAA. Final passage and approval of an annual State Budget is required by the State Constitution of Florida. Each of the current House and Senate’s proposed budgets come in below the overall total (\$91.3 billion) of the Governor’s Recommended Budget, but still represent increases compared to overall funding in the current 2018-2019 State Fiscal Year that ends June 30<sup>th</sup>. The charts and tables and below summarize comparisons of the current year 2018-2019 State Budget and the House and Senate proposals by major category.

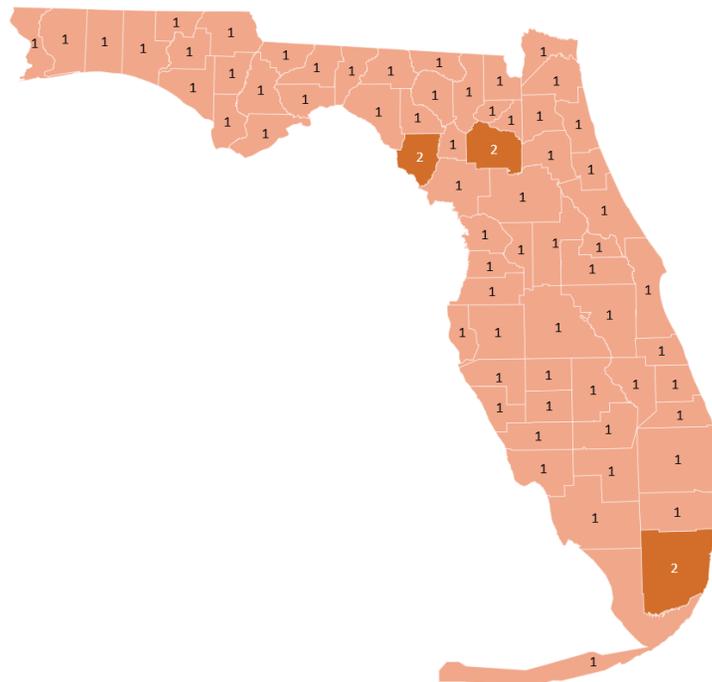

## 2019-2020 House's and Senate's Proposed State Budgets – County Funding Highlights

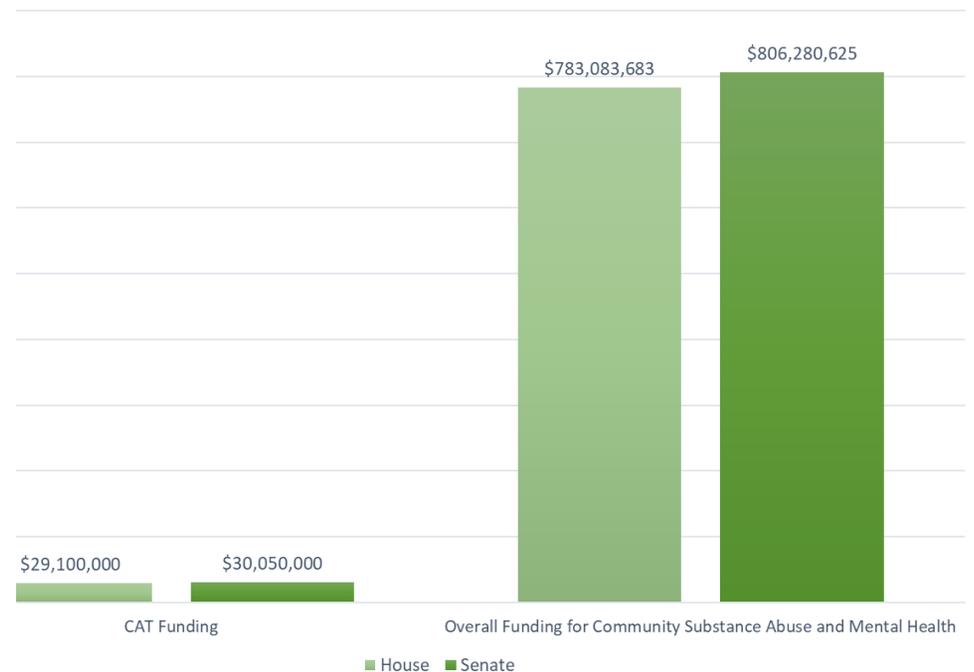
### Mental Health and Substance Abuse

Both the House's and Senate's proposed budgets include enough funding in the Department of Children and Families (DCF) for community action treatment (CAT) teams to be present in every county in Florida. CAT teams provide community-based services to children (ages 11 to 21) with mental health and/or substance abuse diagnoses. CAT teams initially started out as demonstration programs in a few counties and, after successful outcomes, have recently been implemented across the entire state of Florida. The Senate's proposed budget provides slightly more funding for CAT teams—and community mental health and substance abuse funding overall—compared to the House's.

Number of Community Action Treatment (CAT) Teams Funded in House's and Senate's Proposed Budgets



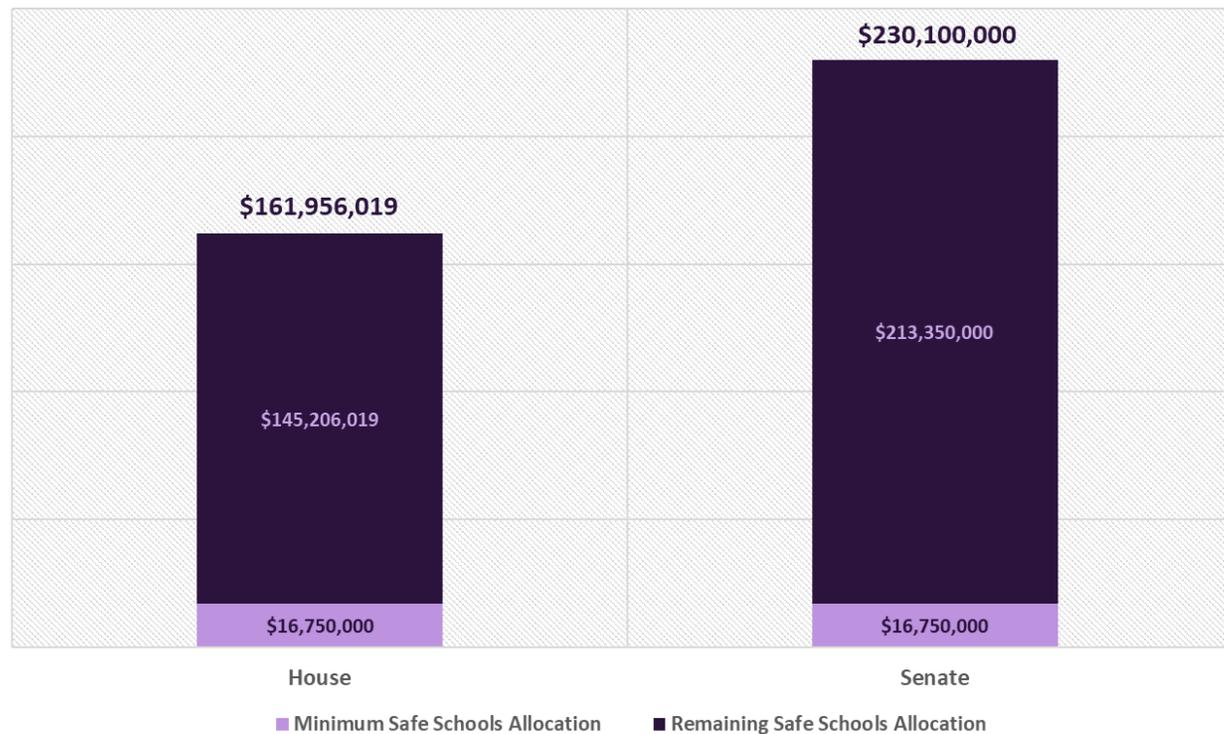
Funding for Community Mental Health and Substance Abuse in House's and Senate's Proposed Budgets



Education and Public Safety

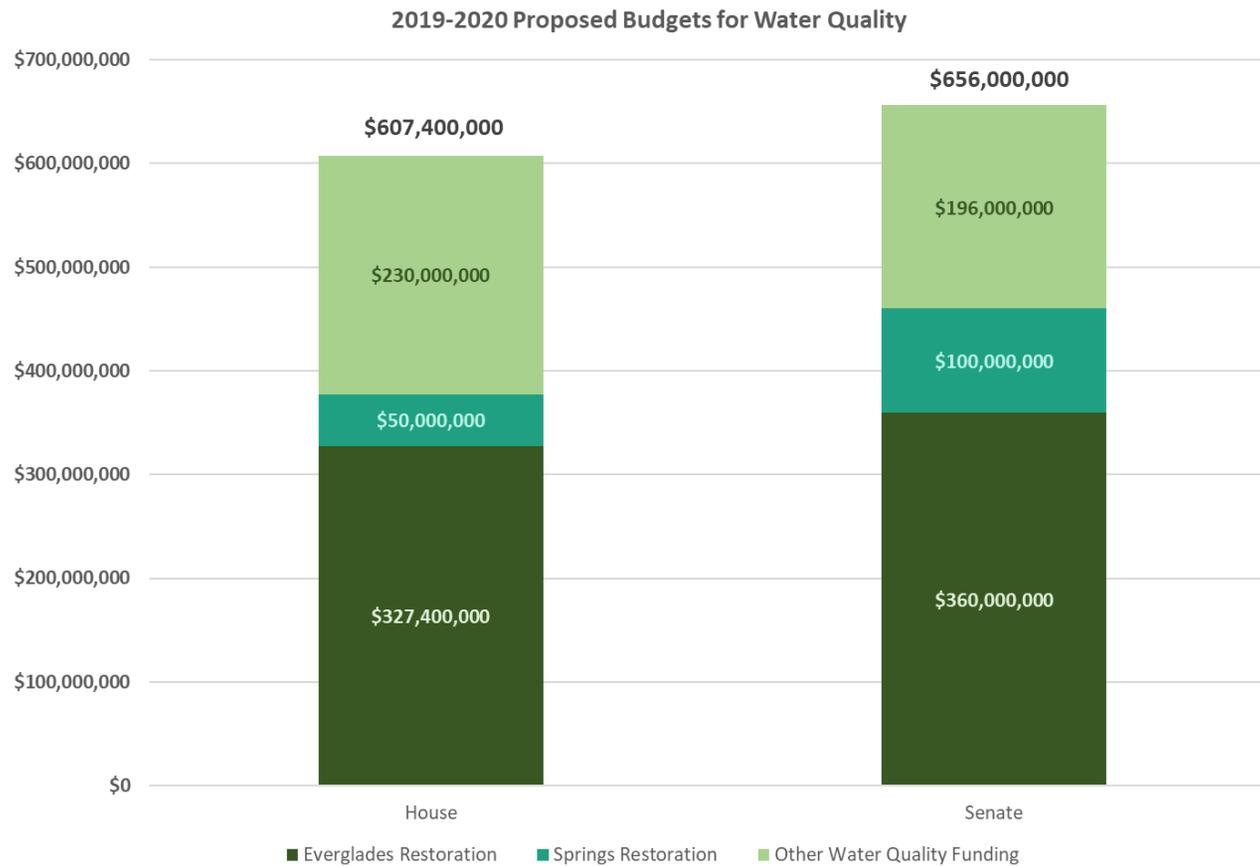
Section 1011.62(15), Florida Statutes directs a “safe schools allocation” to provide funding to assist school districts with school safety, with priority given to implementing each district’s school resource office program. Both the House’s and Senate’s proposed budgets fund a minimum safe schools allocation of \$250,000 per school district, which amounts to a total of \$16,750,000 in funding across all 67 school districts. The Senate’s proposed budget includes a greater remaining balance of funds for safe school allocation at \$213,350,000, bringing its total funding to \$230,100,000. The House proposes a remaining balance of funds of \$145,206,019, bringing its total funding to \$161,956,019. Per the statute, the remaining balance of safe schools allocation funding is distributed with two-thirds weight given to the corresponding county’s most recent official Florida Crime Index as determined by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and one third weight given to each school district’s proportionate share of the state’s total unweighted full-time equivalent student enrollment.

Water Quality

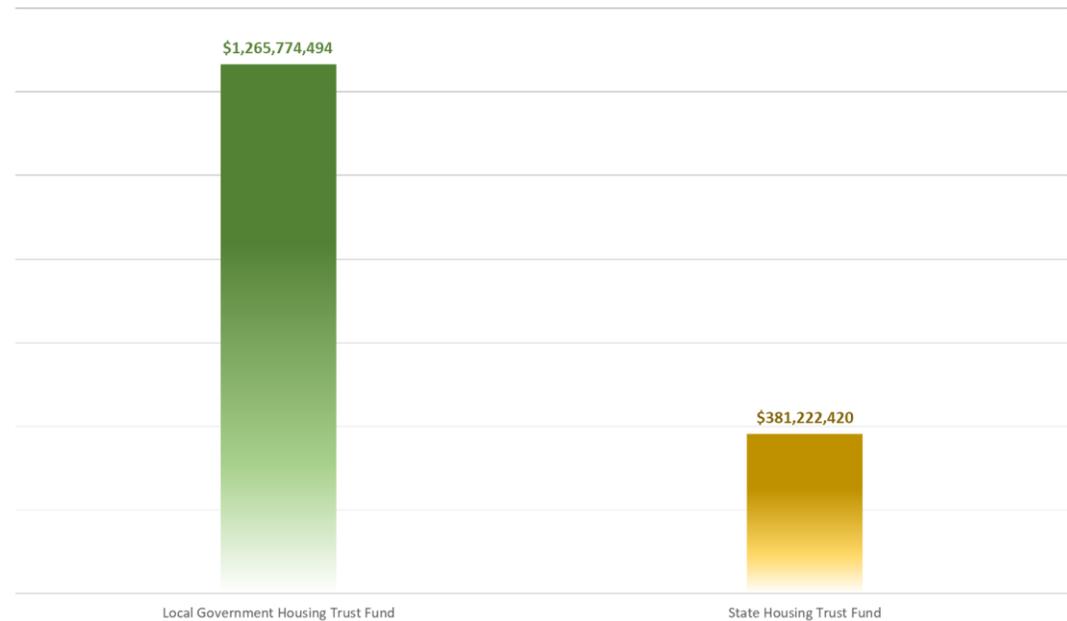
Both the House’s and Senate’s budget proposals respond to the Governor’s initial recommendation of investing \$625 million to prioritize water quality and protection projects. The Senate is proposing an even larger overall figure at \$656 million, while the House wants \$607. 4 million. A key difference between the House and Senate spending plans is on springs restoration, with the House proposing to maintain the current level of funding at \$50 million, while the Senate wants to appropriate an additional \$50 million to bring the total in 2019-2020 to \$100 million.



Affordable Housing

After not having raided either the Local Government Housing Trust Fund or the State Housing Trust Fund for three years from 2005-06 to 2007-08, the Florida Legislature has consistently swept both affordable housing trust funds in every annual State Budget since. From 2008-09 to the current State Fiscal Year, the amount in funds swept totaled \$1,646,996,914, with \$1,265,774,494 (or 77 percent) coming from the Local Government Housing Trust Fund. In his first Recommended Budget to the State Legislature, Governor Ron DeSantis proposed a break from this long-running practice of sweeping affordable housing. The Senate’s proposed budget largely supports the Governor’s recommendation of dedicating Sadowski State and Local Trust Fund dollars to affordable housing efforts, whereas the House’s proposal continues the trend in recent years of raiding most of the funds to support General Revenue.

**CUMULATIVE SWEEPS 2008-09 TO 2018-2019**



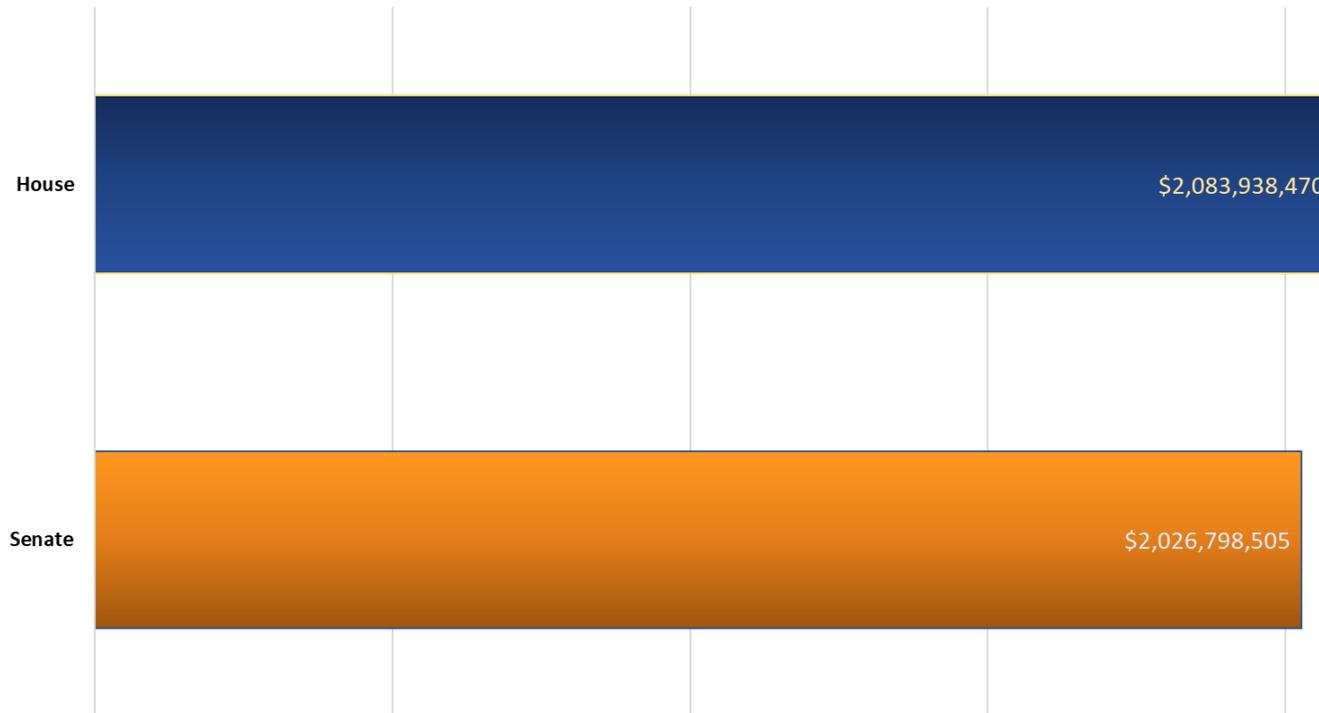

Emergency Management

The one major category where the House is proposing a significant increase in funding compared to the Senate is General Government, which includes the Division of Emergency Management. One factor contributing to this is the inclusion of a new “Hurricane Michael Recovery Grant Program” in the House’s proposed budget which does not appear in the Senate’s proposal. The House wants to fund this grant program at \$50 million total, with the intention to fund: mitigating local and county revenue losses and operating deficits, infrastructure repair and replacement, beach nourishment, and debris removal. In addition to requiring standard documentation for receiving these funds, the House also seeks to require that any local governments receiving these grant funds also agree to reimburse the state in an amount equal to any federal funds, private funds, or insurance proceeds that subsequently become available for the same purpose behind the initial request.
