# **Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill**

April 20, 2010 - explosion and oil spill

<u>July 15, 2010</u> – well capped

April 20, 2011 - BP agrees to \$1 billion in NRDA early restoration

July 6, 2012 - RESTORE Act signed into law

Early 2013 - Transocean civil settlement and criminal

plea agreements with BP and Transocean. NFWF Gulf

**Environmental Benefit Fund established** 

July 2, 2015 – BP Agreement in Principle – \$20.8 billion


October 5, 2015 – NRDA Trustees propose

comprehensive Gulf Restoration Plan & Consent Decree



## Damage Assessment – by the numbers


- 3.19 million barrels (134 million gallons) of oil released into the ocean.
- 15,300 square miles: the maximum extent of the oil slick on a single day (June 19, 2010)—an area 10 times the size of Rhode Island.
- At least 1,300 miles of shoreline fouled by oil—more than the distance by road from New Orleans to New York City.
- 1.84 million gallons of chemical dispersant used.
- Between 51,600 and 84,500 birds of at least 93 species died as a direct result of the spill
- Between 4,900 and 7,600 large juvenile and adult sea turtles, and between 56,000 and 166,000 small juvenile sea turtles, were killed
- Trustees estimate that tens of thousands of dolphins and whales were exposed to Deepwater Horizon oil



43,300 square miles: cumulative extent of the surface slick during the course of the spill—an area approximately equal to the size of Virginia.
