

NFIP State of Play:


- I. Extension likely in CR/Omnibus

- 2. Long-term reauthorization will have to wait until 118th Congress
- 3. Pushing for transparency bills in lame duck on Risk Rating 2.0 roll out



Federal Support for Hurricane lan Response & Recovery

- I. As of November 28, \$3 billion in grants, loans and flood insurance payments has been provided to the state of Florida and its residents to respond to Hurricane lan
- 2. Roughly \$350 million has been obligated through FEMA's Public Assistance Program to eligible local governments and non-profits

- 3. FEMA recently announced it has extended the period for individual assistance applications for survivors to January 12, 2023






Broadband Data Collection System

FCC National Broadband **Availability** Maps Released

- The FCC released their national broadband availability maps in November, which displays all locations served and unserved by broadband infrastructure in the country.
- The FCC's national broadband availability maps will ultimately define state-level funding allocations made under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's (BIL) \$42.45 billion Broadband Equity, Access and Deployment (BEAD) program.
- Counties are highly encouraged to submit any necessary bulk challenges by Friday, January 13th in order to have the best chance to impact BEAD funding allocations for your state, which begin to flow on June 30th, 2023.



ARPA Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund (LATCF)



- ARPA established the LATCF, which provides \$1.5 billion split into two payments
 (\$750m/year) for FYs 22 and 23 to "eligible revenue sharing counties"
 - defined under Treasury's final formula as counties that receive federal PILT payments and/or Refuge Revenue Sharing (RRS) payments from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service
- 2,086 local governments are considered eligible revenue sharing counties under the LATCF formula and will receive between a minimum payment of \$50,000/year (\$100,000 total) and a maximum of \$6 million/year (\$12 million total)
- This includes <u>50 counties in Florida who are collectively eligible for \$8.7 million</u> under the LATCF
- Counties MUST apply through Treasury's online portal by 11:59 p.m. Alaska Standard Time on January 31, 2023, OR FORFEIT BOTH PAYMENTS





Purpose

This memorandum provides background, quidance on Administration priorities and use of Federal-aid highway formula funding, eligibilities, fund information, and definitions for the implementation of the Bridge Replacement, Rehabilitation, Preservation, Protection, and Construction Program (hereafter, Bridge Formula Program (BFP)) as established in title VIII of division J of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, enacted as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Public. Law 117-58 (Nov. 15, 2021).

Background

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) appropriates \$5,500,000,000 for the BFP under the Highway Infrastructure Program for each of Fiscal Years (FY) 2022 through 2026. Funds are distributed to the States by a statutory formula (after set-asides for Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) administration and operations and Tribal transportation facility bridges). The statute requires that the apportionments be adjusted so that each State receives no less than \$45,000,000 each fiscal year. Additionally, 15 percent of each State's distributed funds are set aside for use on offsystem bridges.

Funds made available under the BFP, except as otherwise provided, are to be administered as if apportioned under chapter 1 of title 23, United States Code (U.S.C.). Further, since any project funded under the BFP is to be treated as a project on a Federal-aid highway, Davis-Bacon wage requirements apply to all projects funded with BFP funds.

The FHWA Notice N4510.867 (https://www.fhwa.dot.gov/legsregs/directives/notices/) provides more information on the distribution of FY 2022 funds and applicable statutory requirements. For FY 2023 through 2026 funds, please revisit FHWA's Notices website at the appropriate future time.

Guidance on Administration Priorities and Use of Federal-aid Highway Formula Funding

On December 16, 2021, FHWA issued guidance ("Policy on Using Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Resources to Build a Better America", hereafter "Policy") that serves as an overarching framework to prioritize the use of BIL resources on projects that will Build A Better America. "...the Federal share for costs reimbursed with BFP funds under this program for an offsystem highway bridge owned by a county, town, township, city, municipality or other local agency, or federally-recognized Tribe shall be **100 percent**. The FHWA encourages States to take advantage of this opportunity to use 100 percent Federal funds for off-system highway bridges.

States are required to set aside 15 percent of their BFP funding to address off-system bridge needs. There is no provision authorizing States to reduce the minimum 15 percent setaside amount, and the 15 percent set-aside is a minimum, not a maximum."





- Counties eligible as direct grant recipients for Smart Grid Grants and Grid Innovation Grants
- Counties are indirectly eligible as utility owners or operators to partner with EPA through cooperative agreements for the Grid Resilience Grants
- All programs require a 50% local match, except for small utilities under Grid Resilience Grants where the match is 30%



WHAT TO EXPECT IN FY 2023


- Quicker rollouts of notices of funding than FY 2022
 - Anticipating USDOT RAISE NOFO in January 2023
- New programs in FY 2023
 - USDOT PROTECT Program, Charging and Refueling Infrastructure Grants
- With new programs largely in place, a shifting focus to improving regulations and processes
 - Especially in the U.S. House

\$793 billion over ten years with important health, energy, tax and transportation provisions for county officials, including new direct, competitive grant programs




Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA P.L. 117-169)



KEY HIGHLIGHTS

- \$67.4 billion in new grants, with almost \$40 billion for 18 new grant programs, according to the Federal Funds Information for States (FFIS)
- Section 13801 of the IRA allows certain organizations, including state and local govts., to treat certain tax credit amounts as payments of tax. These payments can be refunded to such organizations as "direct pay".


